The introduction of community days were the children planted trees, cleaned gardens and government areas provided a sense of achievement and value to these children. Through educational initiatives and other programs, we aim to uplift these vulnerable children, helping them regain their sense of dignity and standing within the community.

Our education days with street children represent just one facet of our multifaceted strategy. Through our Outreach Program, we are actively collaborating with local partners to create a community-wide movement that challenges harmful norms, fosters empathy, and builds a future where every child is protected and empowered. The road ahead is long, but with your continued support and dedication, we are confident that our community education program will make a profound impact in raising awareness around child sexual assault and ensuring a brighter future for all our children.

In Australia we worked hard understand our role on the Board and in our various Committees. We understood that the future of Rafiki Mwema may currently be in our hands, but we needed more amazing Volunteers to help drive our message and share out commitment to the children in Kenya. With this commitment, we doubled our Volunteer base and the future is bright!

It's hard to imagine that I am writing this message for our 2022/2023 annual report. Twelve years ago, when the first house opened, my daughter was a baby & I carried her around in her newborn baby pouch. Together we have watched Rafiki Mwema grow, my daughter is almost ready to start high school and I can see Rafiki Mwema has grown and matured just as she has.

It has been a few tough years with COVID, the economy of the world, the many changes we have had at Rafiki Mwema but it's clear that everything that has happened just makes us stronger. It's an absolute pleasure to work alongside the staff in Kenya and the volunteers we have dedicating their precious time and skills in Australia. We have a wonderful team who are all focused on the same end goal and their commitment to the work we do is inspiring. I SAID IT! And if you have followed Rafiki Mwema for some time, you will know that I don't throw around that word lightly. I believe it is important to follow up the word 'inspiring' with HOW they have inspired you... Our team inspire me to keep going. Some days are very hard, and it can often feel like we take 3 steps forward and 5 steps backwards but having this wonderful team really does inspire me to continue.

I think it's clear just who inspires us as a whole and that is every one of our children. These precious children who have had their innocence stolen from them show us a strength that I never imagined was possible. A strength one rarely sees in an adult, let alone a 3-year-old child.

I acknowledge that there is so much heartache in the world and it is easy to just become immune to the sad pictures/videos you see on the news or social media. I want to thank those of you who have supported us, whether that be a one-off donation or an ongoing sponsorship. Thank you for choosing our organisation to support when there are so many organisations out there. Thank you for trusting us. Thank you for seeing our children and not just scrolling by.

It's important we continue to shed light on the huge issue that continues to be swept under the carpet around the world and that is child sexual abuse. So many people refuse to speak about it and, time and time again, I hear people say, 'Why is there so much abuse in Kenya?' Sadly, it's not the abuse in Kenya that is the problem, it is that there are not a lot of facilities to help which is where we come in. Child sexual abuse is a huge problem around the world, in every city, every town. We need to speak up and NOT STAY SILENT so the children being abused feel that they too can speak up and be heard.

Please continue to stand with us while we do all we can to help the children who need our assistance in Kenya and remember this does not always need to be in a monetary form. It can be by volunteering for us in Australia, sharing our post on social media, buying something from our online store or just talking to someone about the work we do. It all adds up as we continue to struggle with our monthly running costs.

Chatting to people about the work we do is invaluable and proof of this is Constance Hall. One of our supporters, Jessica, told Constance about the work we do and from that moment our lives have changed, early on we had no idea how much they would be changed. Still, to this day, Constance continues to advocate for us in all that she does, and we are so lucky to have her in our family. We are patiently waiting for her to come back to Kenya!

Before I finish my message for this years report, I must mention the devastation our family faced with the loss of one of our family members. Simon (Melvin) Wachira came to live with us when he was a young boy, he stayed with us until he was a 18, but the demons always haunted him and he was never quite able to leave from the pull that the streets had over him. Although he was not able to live with us at Rafiki Mwema, I continued to keep track of him and supported him when I could. In March 2023, Wachira was taken from this world too soon and the impact this had on our family as a whole was huge. He was murdered by the police and there is not a damn thing we can do about it, but I will continue to fight for him and all those out there like him who were not born with the same rights as other children.

We look forward to sharing some of the ups and downs we have faced over the last 12 months in the report ahead. Thank you for supporting the work we do, as we continue to remain transparent and dedicated to ensuring Rafiki Mwema is here for many generations to come.

Community Education

Our Rafiki Mtaani team and Outreach team teamed up recently to visit a few primary schools in a high-risk area. Many child abuse cases occur in this area, many street children in Nakuru have travelled from here, some children are already using drugs and sometimes girls are forced into marriage.

As part of our community awareness-raising efforts, our teams spoke to both the school children and the teachers about children's rights. They also spoke to the adults about referral pathways, should a teacher become aware of abuse. We are #notsilent.

We speak up because we want to end the stigma associated with rape and child sexual abuse. We want children to know that they will be heard and believed. We want adults to protect children. Our teams were really happy with the reception they received, and we all hope that through this community work, the cycle of abuse will begin to be broken in this area.

The day this little one arrived to the farm was a day that changed all of us forever. She was so young and photos of her arrival show the horror on our staff's face when they saw her.

Fighting for justice has not been easy with this case. We have faced years of disappointments upon disappointments in court. We attended court through the 2020 lockdown with curfews in place and but this did not deter us at all and they turned up, along with our baby girl, to attend and testify.

Many times we didn't succeed to give testimony because of her age and for so many other (frustrating) issues within the court. So many days, hundreds of hours were spent getting up early and returning late but our staff stood strong and firm and never once showed they were backing down. With the support of our team, our girl was able to clearly testify and we could not be happier to let you know that her perpetrator has received a LIFE SENTENCE and we will make sure he rots in prison and is never released.

Our girl will never forget this time in her life but we believe that our love and support will be the bigger memory that is in her mind and she will forever be part of our family.

Now it's time to work on the integration back into her loving community and get her life back to normal. Thank you for supporting us to continue these battles we fight. We are fighting so many but we can't do this without your support.

The two teams, Rafiki Lion and Rafiki Twiga, were born, and the children were overjoyed to be part of this exciting venture.

The heartwarming initiative was made possible through the collaboration of long-term supporters and friends, Barefruit Marketing. Their commitment to the well-being of these children went beyond financial aid, as they played a crucial role in connecting Rafiki Mwema with the Northern Rivers Football Academy. This collaboration not only provided the children with a tangible expression of unity but also opened up new avenues for recreational activities and personal development.









The children now look forward to special football days on weekends and during holidays, where they can proudly don their personalized soccer uniforms. The sense of belonging and the thrill of being part of a team contribute to the positive environment fostered by Rafiki Mwema, creating lasting memories for the children and instilling in them the values of teamwork, discipline, and the joy of shared experiences. The gesture from Northern Rivers Football Academy, facilitated by Barefruit Marketing, serves as a testament to the power of collaboration and community support in making a meaningful impact on the lives of these young individuals.

in March 2023 a bomb went off and our Rafiki Mwema family have been dealing with the necessary while in complete shock.

We received news that one of our (ex) children had died and there were many rumours going around town that he had been killed in police custody.

Our beautiful Conci rushed straight to the hospital to confirm and sadly she arrived at the right time and needed to identify him at the morgue. Conci was not prepared for this but she did what she needed to do. This young man who she had cared for since he was approx 11 years old lay dead in the morgue. She confirmed it was him and that it was clear he had been injured.

Day's pass and our family on the street have been protesting for his life and for answers. Nothing was making sense and no one was talking about it. How can this happen? All we know is he was arrested and then died in custody. His family made the decision to not do an autopsy as they don't want trouble. They know nothing can or will be done no matter what is found and they knew they just needed to accept that he is gone.

The protests in town were getting louder and the kids were getting angrier.. and I don't blame them for one second. Imagine a life meaning so little that a perfectly healthy young man can turn up at hospital dead and no one does a thing! These children are treated like trash while they are on the streets, trying to survive against the cruel world they were born into and now they are dead they are still not given an ounce of respect or concern. The kids in town gathered in large groups and continued to fight for their brother. They showed bravery that many of us would never witness in our life. They were screaming for his life that had been taken from him, while putting themselves under threat that the exact same thing could happen to them.

They got the media's attention and the protests were gaining traction and were all over social media. The police and family had no choice but to agree to an autopsy, as it was clear, this large family of discarded children were not going to stop until they had answers and we could not be prouder.

The autopsy was held 2 days ago by the Government Pathologist in the presence of 3 of his relatives, a Representative of the Directorate of Criminal Investigation, Representative of Human Rights Body, 2 Officers from the Government Forensic Department as well as our own Uncle Erick.

The results came back and it was very clear what had happened. He was a healthy young man, and he did not die from an illness. He died from torturous injuries and there is no clear explanation on where he received them. Even our Uncle Erick, who has worked in the prison system and has seen everything you can imagine wrote to me 'I took my time last night doing self reflection. The torture, the pain and agony he was put through cannot be explained. What is it that he did to deserve that?'

I would also like to know. What is it he did to deserve that? We will probably never see justice for what happened to him, but it was a small win for the children who would not back down when they were being threatened. Everyday we wear our uniforms that say 'I will not stay silent' and we do our best to practice this. There is only so much we can speak up about to ensure we keep our children and organisation safe but we will continue to love these children who live on the streets and we will continue to show up for them everyday and show them they are worthy of love.

We will not forget our King and we will honour him as each year passes. We will do all we can to continue to fight for the rights of these children and show the world they are not dangerous, THEY ARE CHILDREN.. they treat you how you treat them! You beat them? They will try and beat you! You love them.. they will try and love you. and when they finally drop their guard, they love hard.

This week has been tough and yesterday, they buried our King Melvin. Rest in Peace, Wachira.

We will never forget you and I am so sorry there was not more we could do to help you live the life you deserved.



Our Rafiki Mtaani are ready to learn!




Every day we do something different with our family in town before we have lunch. Football, beading, painting, talking and yesterday it was mathematics.

As a testament to her enduring support, we are eager to hear and share Claire's reflections on this transformative experience.



"After ten years of being on the board of Rafiki Mwema, I finally met the children and staff in Kenya, whom we work so hard to give a voice to. It has been my passion to help these children in any way I can since my close friend Sarah Rosborg asked me to start a charity with her ten years ago. In November 2022, I had the opportunity to travel to Kenya and witness the fantastic work being done by Rafiki Mwema first-hand. I joined Sarah Rosborg, the founder of Rafiki Mwema, on this journey – one she has done many times.

Wow, just wow!

I have been talking about our children at Rafiki for the last ten years. I was involved in the fundraiser to buy our land and build new homes. I've met some of the children and staff over Zoom, and I read the heartbreaking stories of the children every day. Yet nothing (NOTHING!) could have prepared me for this visit. I was expecting to be a blubbering mess. I am a crier (with a not-very-nice cry face) and expected to be surrounded by sadness.

Happiness everywhere, despite such sadness

But, from the moment we arrived at Doyle Farm, all I experienced was happiness! The children and staff are all so happy and playful. Of course, the stories behind the children are beyond sad, but you can feel their happiness on the farm because they are safe here. They are loved, protected and secure. There was non-stop laughter, playing and dancing. And music! All day long. We stayed near the big girl's house, and the music and dancing started around 6 am and finished long after us nanas went to bed. Thanks to our incredible supporters, sponsors and donors, our children are happy, safe, well-fed, well-educated, and appreciative of things our children take for granted.

We can all Make a Difference

Seeing the impact of the work that we, and so many volunteers, do at Rafiki Mwema was life-changing. It reminds you of the importance of giving back and making a difference in the world. My trip to Kenya was a powerful reminder of the incredible impact humans can make when we put our minds to something and pull together. I am grateful for the opportunity to witness the amazing work we all do for Rafiki Mwema and for the chance to support these children on their journey towards a brighter future.

Supporting Rafiki Mwema, as with most causes, doesn't just have to be financial, although that is what keeps the lights on. 

We have spent months working with this wonderful firm and they have spent so much time with our team on the ground, allowing them to speak freely and share their opinion on what is working and what could be improved.


We are teaching our staff that unlike so many other businesses in Kenya, they are free to speak up and share their opinion and they will not be reprimanded or even fired if they do so.
